

OUR INSTITUTION HAS A CHILD PROTECTION POLICY. These are rules designed to ensure that you – children and young people – are protected from harm.

- In our institution, everyone has the right to safety. We want to protect you from various forms of abuse, including physical and psychological aggression.
- Child abuse is the commission of a criminal offence to the detriment of a child by any person.
- Everyone should treat you with respect. No one should use any form of violence against you or behave inappropriately.
- You have the right to be treated in the same way as all other children.
- Your opinions and feelings are important. We encourage you to express your thoughts in a safe way. No one is allowed to use vulgar language, gestures, or jokes towards you.
- You have the right to ask questions of employees and receive comprehensive answers.
- You have a right to privacy. IYMC staff are not permitted to disclose information about you to other adults or children, except in justified cases.
- Remember no one has the right to violate your personal space, make intimate proposals to you, or touch you in a way that crosses the boundaries of proper behavior.
- No one should record or photograph you without your consent.
 If you don't want to appear in photos say NO. No one is allowed to distribute your image without the consent of your parents or guardians.
- No form of aggression is acceptable. If you are struggling with a problem or know that someone around you has one, you are not alone. Tell us about it.
- If you feel threatened, unsafe, or witness inappropriate behavior, report it immediately to an adult, e.g. the receptionists, educators, or the director.
- If you see a peer with a problem or in a difficult situation, encourage them to seek help or do so together with them.
- We support you and your peers and offer you our help in solving the problem and, if necessary, ask other organisations for help. We offer you a safe and friendly place to talk.
